Note no rxn to verbal or tactile stimulation. Note no pupillary light reflex (pupils should be fixed/dilated). Note no breathing or lung sounds or heart beat/pulse **when to call coroner: if pt was in hospital <24hrs, death w/ unusual circumstances, or if death was assoc w/ trauma regardless of cause of death**.

Use of eye glasses and magnifying lenses, hearing aids and earwax disimpaction. Early correction of dehydration. Use of a scheduled pain management protocol. Minimization of unnecessary noise/stimuli. Strategies for the prevention and management of delirium in the ICU are important areas for future investigation.

Management of Delirium in the ICU

The patient should be 15-30 degrees head up the majority of the time unless there is a contraindication to being head up (eg unstable spine). The standard feed in this unit is prescribed by the dietician and supplied from the kitchen. It is a mixture of blended foods and feeding supplement (complan).

Safe and effective management of an adult ICU patient's pain and anxiety demands a delicate balance of analgesia and sedation protocols while managing delirium. As shown in Figure 1, an optimum state of analgesia, sedation, and delirium management result in reduced pain, decreased anxiety, managed delirium, amnesia, and recovery.
